<u>Isaiah for Modern Times</u> — set of 7 audio CDs. Isaiah is the first of the Major Prophets. His long tenure as prophet to the kings of Judah saw the collapse of the northern kingdom of Israel and predicted the end of the kingdom of Judah as well. Those predictions occurred during the later prophetic offices of Jeremiah and Ezekiel.

<u>Ezekiel and Prophecy</u> — set of 4 audio CDs. The prophet's ministry was in the early years of the Babylonian exile, between 593/592 – 571/570 BC. Ezekiel in Babylon envisaged the fall and restoration of Israel. His older contemporary, Jeremiah, in Jerusalem, actually beheld the dying gasps of the Kingdom of Judah.

<u>Jeremiah and Prophecy</u> — set of 4 audio CDs. Jeremiah is one of the Major Prophets in the Bible. Jeremiah was a priest and was called to the prophetic office at a most unhappy time. This series of CDs covers the prophet and his writings.

<u>Minor Prophets for Today</u> — set of 14 audio CDs. The Twelve Minor Prophets are chronological in presentation. They relate, interact, explain, and provide a second witness to many other prophecies.
